- To the large complex of the **Sečovlje saltpans** (museum and the natural park), of great regional relevance. A guide from the Sečovlje Saltpans Nature Park will explain the great ecological significance of the long history of saltpans.
- To the coastal town of **Piran** (walk & lunch)
- To the **Idrija mercury mine**, the only early modern enterprise of global importance in Slovenian territory. Mine archives in Idrija reach back until 1700; participants will be informed of how one can study 16th- and 17th-century Idrija mine history, the history of times leaving hardly any trace in the preserved archive of the mine itself.
